Chuck Chats

I am thankful on this day for the privilege I have been given to attend a conference by and for preachers in Atlanta, Georgia. We are in the second day of worship, listening to wonderful sermons and hearing lectures on preaching. I can understand if that doesn't excite you, but you can be thankful it excites me! Maybe I'll get a few good ideas, some great stories and be better at this craft the next time you hear me. Pray for me!

I was honored to be at a worship service last night in which Archbishop Desmond Tutu brought the sermon. The music was marvelous – classical pianist, jazz chorus, outstanding vocalists and the sermon was a study in grace, humility and child-like celebration of God's grace.

Among the many delightful aspects of his sermon, Archbishop Tutu paid his respects to our country and to the pastors gathered there who had been supportive of boycotting apartheid late in the 1980s and early 1990s. It was the support of the U.S. and religious institutions employing economic and moral leverage that helped bring an end to that odi-

ous system. He invited us to become South Africans for just a moment and to applaud ourselves on behalf of his countrymen.

It was a touching moment and reminded me of how vital it is for people of faith to act on their beliefs. What was argued at the time was that the efforts of such things as boycotts and disinvestment would negatively impact the black South Africans the efforts were meant to assist. Archbishop Tutu's response was that it was better they suffer for the sake of justice than that they suffer ongoing injustice.

I am mindful that what we believe about God, what we do in seeking to follow Jesus, how we accept the guidance of the Holy Spirit makes a difference. Or it should.

How do we understand God's working in our lives individually? As a community of faith? Within the challenges of our culture, our community, our social system?

What are we doing here at Asbury so that we can accomplish things of lasting value for Christ? This is an important question to keep asking ourselves as a community of faith. It is a question that has no permanent answers for we are

always on the move forward as a community. That's exciting, because we are not willing to rest until we see the Kingdom of God a reality!

That's a tall order! I'm not going to live to see it, but it is a goal worth the cost of picking up our own crosses and following Jesus. But I want to consider as I near my 54th birthday this September, that I have fewer years of pastoral ministry ahead than I do behind me – and I want the years ahead to count for something. That makes me anticipate greatly the months and years ahead as God does new things in our midst and calls us all into new forms of ministry together.

Being on that journey with this great congregation is a blessing and provides me the opportunity to continue to grow in my faith and my sense of usefulness for Christ. How is God leading you in your own journey? I look forward to finding out!

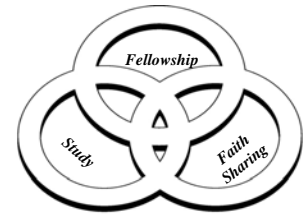
Have You Been Baptized? If Not, Are You Ready To Be?

please contact him.

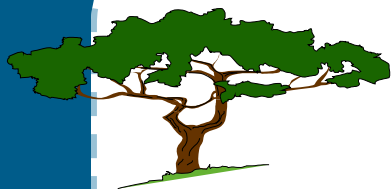
Our first Theology Pub is going to be June 23. Stay tuned to Facebook and the bulletin for location and time.

Backpack Project

This year Clay Smith is coordinating Asbury's portion of the Interfaith Backpack Project as his Eagle Scout Project.

The Backpack Project is organized by the Tri-Valley Interfaith Council which has nine religious institutions in it. Together, the Tri-Valley Interfaith Council raises money each year, to buy backpacks and school supplies for nearly 1,000 children in the surrounding areas. This year Asbury has committed to donating 100 backpacks, and five additional bags of supplies. Gift certificates for new shoes are also included along with the school supplies. Please consider making a donation to this effort. Forty dollars will cover one backpack, supplies, and a math calculator.

Bundles of Joy

We are continuing to help Lynwood UMC with their Bundles of Joy outreach program. Bundles of Joy provides bags of baby care items and newborn clothing to families in the Tri-Valley who participate in the prenatal program provided by Axis Community Health. Axis is the sole provider of prenatal services to local residents who are indigent and uninsured. Approximately 20% of all the deliveries at Valley Care (about 25 ba-

bies per month) are Axis clients.

Bundles of Joy is an on-going project; our goal is to provide 10 bags per month to Axis. We can't do this without the continued support of our church family. This project serves local families that are struggling to provide for the very basic needs of a newborn. Special thanks to the leaders of this outreach - Heidi Stark, Helen Whitaker and Kristin Speck.

Items Needed for the Bundles of Joy Project:

newborn diapers, wipes, baby wash, lotion, powder or ointment, bottles (3 Pack), newborn outfits, baby booties or socks, bibs, rattles, pacifiers, cloth toys or stuffed animals.

Let Go, Let God

There are a number of faiths and religions that support the mantra, "Let go and let God", meaning, let go of what troubles you or has caused turmoil in your life and let God take care of it. This "sounds" easy, however it can be one of the most difficult things to do. When people feel stressed, worried and fearful, it is difficult to remember that "everything" in life, both the good and the bad is in divine order.

Our needs can conflict with the, "Let go, Let God" approach, creating an environment where we feel isolated or distant from our faith or our place of worship. Many of us were raised with the idea that we must "take control" of our lives if we are to be successful. Actually, it's the other way around. Letting go of our lives and giving ourselves to God is the truly successful life. The burden of maintaining control becomes almost too much to bear. It is at this time that "letting go" becomes a viable option. It's the time to say, "God, you're in charge now. Guide me. Show me the way. I'm ready to follow." Be ready, sometimes His way is for us to do nothing, and you know how impatient we can get.

The application of "Let go and Let God" is for anyone who has a difficulty, problem or situation they are dealing with. It is most difficult for people who have someone they are close to, who has an alcohol or drug problem. The important thing is to take time to let God into your life.

So, how do you do it? Close your eyes and relax. Begin to think of God, telling yourself quietly, "I let go. I let God into my life." Take a deep breath and repeat this thought. Know that God's wisdom is available to you, ready to guide you and fill you with new understanding. The next time you are reacting to life, rather than seeking God's help, remember these sage words from a Reverend, "Don't tell God about your big problems; tell your problems about your big God." God does for you, that which you cannot do for yourself.

Here is something which I found helpful for your consideration:

"Let go, Let God – Fear less, Love more"

To let go doesn't mean to stop caring; it means I can't do it for someone else.

To let go is not to cut myself off; it's the realization that I can't control another.

To let go is not to enable, but to allow learning from natural consequences.

To let go is to admit powerlessness, which means the outcome is not in my hands.

To let go is not to try to change or blame another; it is to make the most of myself.

To let go is not to care for, but to care about.

To let go is not to fix, but to be supportive.

To let go is not to judge, but to allow another to be a human being.

To let go is not to be in the middle, arranging all the outcomes, but to allow others to affect their own destinies.

To let go is not to be protective; it is to permit another to face reality.

To let go is not to deny, but to accept.

To let go is not to nag, scold, or argue, but instead to search out my own shortcomings and correct them.

To let go is not to adjust everything to my desires, but to take each day as it comes, and to cherish myself in it.

To let go is not to regret the past, but to grow and live in the present.

To let go is to fear less and to love more.
